Joined-up humanitarian-development analysis and planning towards collective outcomes

In 2017 the The Royal Town Planning Institute (RTPI) has continued to provide the United Kingdom (UK) government departments with access to professional built environment expertise through the United Kingdom Built Environment Advisory Group (UKBEAG) which comprises the professional planning, architectural and engineering institutes. In 2017 we have provided the Foreign and Commonwealth Office with a roster of professionals based in the Caribbean to help recover from the hurricanes Irma and Maria and so that they could engage in a public/private forum on building back better and longer-term recovery and reconstruction. This had a particular focus on the three UK Overseas Territories worst hit by Hurricane Irma (Anguilla, British Virgin Islands and Turks and Caicos).

In 2018, the RTPI has decided to start a chiefly in-house research endeavour on resilience and capacity building in one or more rapidly urbanising or vulnerable areas in the Commonwealth, with a focus on areas affected by extreme climate events. We are building partnerships for the project and we are shaping it so that a capacity-building project can be designed based on the research's findings.

What concrete actions have you taken in support of the initiative.

In 2017 the The Royal Town Planning Institute (RTPI) has continued to provide the Global Alliance for Urban Crises (GAUC) access to professional built environment expertise in its particular area of expertise: planning. The Institute has committed to provide access specifically to trained and experienced planners to the Global Alliance for Urban Crises appointing two of its members to take part in the GAUC's working groups.

The RTPI has appointed one member to work in the GAUC's working group 2 (Urban Expertise), and one in working group 4 (Urban Resilience). The Institute's International Office is supporting working group 1 (Urban Profiling and Coordination) and offering advice to working group 3 (Urban Displacement).
